A Way Forward for Dental Public Health Education in Malaysia

The fact that this is a re-appointment is a testament to her dedication, hard work, and expertise in the field of dentistry and especially with regard to dental education and training.

Members of MADPHS are proud to see Associate Prof Dr Tuti taking on this leading role in UKM dental school. She has been an inspiration to many of us. Her passion for dentistry, commitment to excellence, and leadership skills will undoubtedly make a significant impact on the next generation of dental professionals.

Given her extensive background in curriculum development and involvement with various curriculum review boards, we had a brief interview with Associate Prof Dr Tuti to gain insight into a potential way forward for dental public health (DPH) education in Malaysia.

on your appointment as Dean, Faculty of Dentistry, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia on the 29th April 2022

In your opinion, how has the curriculum for DPH evolved over the years to align with changing societal needs?

DPH has always acknowledged the impact of social determinants on health status and outcomes. Hence with the changing needs of society, the DPH curriculum recognises the importance of addressing broader social determinants of health that influence people's lives. For example, a greater emphasis is now given to interdisciplinary collaboration, highlighting the need for professionals from different fields to work together to address the complex interplay of social and health problems. As a result, DPH curriculums have expanded to include coursework in areas such as sociology, economics, and political science.

Another aspect is the growing interconnectedness of the world which has led to a greater focus on global health in public health programs. Some programmes now include coursework on international health issues and the impact of globalization on health. By adapting to these changes and incorporating new approaches, public health professionals including DPHS can continue to promote health and improve overall health outcomes for individuals and communities.

Technology has become increasingly important in public health;

I believe new DPH curriculums have expanded the scope of topics such as data analytics, health informatics, and advanced epidemiology. Moreover, greater exposure is needed to digital technology such as the use of electronic health records, telemedicine, and mobile health apps - emphasizing the ethical issues surrounding their applications in societal health.



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How has your previous experience in MADPHS helped to enhance your leadership skills?

I played some minor background roles to support the initiation of MADPHS by our Founding President Prof Rahimah Abdul Kadir. Most of the time I was just an Ordinary Member but later served as Council Member prior to my appointment as President for the 2020-2022 term.

The most important lesson I have learned while being the President of MADPHS is to effectively work with other DPHS from other agencies, namely the MOH, MOD and other universities. Together, we learn to focus on our common aspirations to advance the science and practice of DPH through sharing of resources and smart collaborations, while at the same time navigating through our own institutional commitments. Undoubtedly, we have many similarities that may be channelled to realise our goals of better health and oral health for all.

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Through my involvement in MADPHS, I have been able to collaborate with other professional associations that share the same passion for the promotion of population health and well-being in our country as well as globally. Some of the NGOs that we have worked with are IDAM, ACFF Malaysia, Malaysian Health Coalition and others.

How to instil leadership and management skills in the DPH curriculum to prepare graduates to take up leadership & management roles one day?

1. Strengthening Leadership and Management Courses:

We can strengthen specific courses that focus on leadership and management skills, including health advocacy. These courses can cover topics such as strategic planning, financial management, human resources management, health marketing, and project management.

2. Providing Mentorship and Internship Opportunities:

This can be done through partnerships with public health organizations or the Ministry of Health, allowing students to work on real-world projects, health systems and policies, and learn from experienced professionals and leaders.

3. Offering Case-Based Learning:

We can use real-world case studies to teach students how to apply leadership and management principles to public health challenges.



What key changes have been/should be made to the DPH curriculum to reflect advancements in research, technology, and evidence-based practice?

I believe our DPH curriculum has undergone significant changes in recent years to reflect advancements in research, technology, and evidence-based practice. Some key changes include:

Integration of Data Science: With the increasing importance of big data in public health research, many public health/DPH programs have integrated data science into their curriculum. This includes coursework in data management, analysis, and visualisation, as well as training in the use of advanced statistical techniques and machine learning algorithms.

Emphasis on Translational Research: DPH programs now emphasize the importance of translational research, which involves translating research findings into practice. This includes coursework in implementation science, dissemination and implementation research, and program evaluation.

Focus on Precision Public Health: Precision public health is an emerging field that aims to tailor public health interventions to the specific needs of individuals and populations. Hopefully, the aspect of precision of public health can be enhanced in our future DPH curriculum to better prepare our graduates with the necessary knowledge and skills to implement such approaches.

PKPD Petaling (Klinik Pergigian Seksyen 19, Shah Alam) in partnership with MADPHS had conducted an oral health education program for orphanage children in Teratak Nur Barakah. The programme aimed to improve the oral health of orphanage children and promote healthy habits that they can carry into adulthood. Approximately 20 children benefited from this programme. This programme included interactive sessions that used game-based activities to cover topics such as proper tooth brushing and flossing techniques, the importance of regular dental check-ups, and the impact of diet on oral health. children were also provided with toothbrushes, toothpastes, and toiletries sponsored by Colgate-Palmolive Malaysia to encourage them to practice good personal hygiene. In addition to the educational sessions, Klinik Pergigian Seksyen 19 offered free dental checkups and treatments to the children.

On the 31st of October 2022, MADPHS became one of the collaborative partners with the Alliance for Cavity-Free Future Malaysia Chapter (ACFF MC) in celebrating the World Cavity-Free Future Day (WCFFD) Malaysia 2022. WCFFD is an annually celebrated global event that brings together dental and healthcare professionals, as well as individuals and groups from around the world, to promote the message that cavities can be prevented.

The launching of WCFFD Malaysia 2022 was officiated by Dr Noormi Othman, Principal Director of Oral Health, Ministry of Health Malaysia, at the International Islamic University Malaysia (IIUM), Kuantan Campus. Various activities were conducted such as a symposium on sugar and early childhood caries, oral hygiene instruction workshops for kindergarten teachers, fluoride therapy hands-on sessions for dental therapists and dental surgery assistants, and a photography competition.



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The WCFFD Malaysia 2022 was sponsored by Colgate-Palmolive and Southern Lion Malaysia. MADPHS also contributed by sponsoring a speaker, our very own President Elect, Associate Professor Dr Budi Aslinie Md Sabri who shared a highly engaging talk entitled "Public Health Perspectives on Sugar Management".

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THE ROLE OF MADPHS IN HEALTH ADVOCACY

The Malaysian Health Coalition (MHC) was established on 1st March 2020, during COVID-19 pandemic, as a coalition of 53 professional societies representing doctors, specialists, dentists, pharmacists, nurses, allied health professionals, alongside dedicated citizens working together to engage in health advocacy and supporting Health in All policies (https://myhealthcoalition.org/). During COVID-19 pandemic, MHC has been actively providing evidence-based information related to COVID-19 to the public, supporting the Ministry of Health and engaging with relevant stakeholders to recommend strategies and measures to mitigate the outbreak.



MADPHS is part of this powerful coalition (MHC) and actively supports various joint statements related to health issues with the aim of protecting the health of Malaysians. With these joint statements "on record", advocates can respond promptly and express their support or opposition when needed. For example, recently on 4th April 2023, MHC expressed disappointment with the government's decision to collect excise taxes on nicotine liquids and gel used in e-cigarettes and vaping devices and called for clear laws on vaping before any taxation. We share concerns about the public health implications of vaping and tobacco use among young generations. Malaysia Perlu Undang-Undang Vape Sebelum Mengenakan Cukai

Gabungan Kesihatan Malaysia amat prihatin dan kecewa dengan keputusan untuk mengutip cukai eksais atas cecair nikotin dan gel yang digunakan dalam e-rokok dan peranti vape mulai 1 April 2023. Keputusan ini diumumkan pada 31 Mac 2023 dalam Warta Persekutuan.

Kami maklum bahawa undang-undang sedia ada di Malaysia tidak membenarkan atau mengharamkan e-rokok atau peranti vape dengan jelas. Oleh itu, status e-rokok dan peranti vape adalah tidak tertulis dan tidak jelas, tanpa sebarang peraturan untuk mengawal penggunaan peranti vape atau mengurangkan bahaya peranti vape kepada populasi yang terdedah seperti kanak-kanak atau remaja.

Bagi membolehkan cukai eksais ini dilaksanakan secara sah, Menteri Kesihatan terpaksa mengecualikan cecair dan gel nikotin daripada Akta Racun 1952 (juga diumumkan pada 31 Mac 2023). Kami kesal kerana pengecualian ini diperlukan sebagai langkah pentadbiran kerana Malaysia masih belum membuat keputusan untuk membenarkan atau mengharamkan peranti vape. As dentists/dental specialists in collaboration with other health professional groups, we have the potential to form a powerful lobbying force and advocate for policy changes [1]. Advocacy encompasses a wide range of efforts aimed at improving the quality of life for individuals, families, and communities at various levels [2]. In the context of health, advocacy plays a crucial role in creating sustainable health systems that prioritise the well-being of individuals, communities, and the environment. It involves speaking up and taking action to influence policies, practices, and behaviours that impact health outcomes. When individuals and communities join forces in health advocacy, it can lead to positive changes that promote sustainable health for present and future generations [1,2]. OVERLOOKED & COSTLY: THE BURDEN OF PERIODONTITIS IN MALAYSIA

Periodontal disease in Malaysia affected an estimated 12 million adults in 2020, with a half-a-million increase from a previous national survey in 2010 [1]. Vulnerable and marginalised populations are at higher risk due to limited access to oral healthcare services and inadequate oral hygiene care. Ageing populations and urbanisation also contribute to the rise. This issue is significant, as periodontitis shares risk factors with major non-communicable diseases (NCDs) that cause two-thirds of deaths in Malaysia.

Based on the Markov model, the estimated utilisation of oral healthcare services among adults with periodontitis in Malaysia is alarmingly low, with only 0.7% seeking dental treatment in 2020 [1]. This is particularly concerning as early detection of periodontal disease is crucial, and low utilisation of dental services may contribute to worsening periodontal health and social inequalities. Action must be taken to improve the utilisation of oral healthcare services for early detection and prevention of periodontitis, as it has a significant individual and societal impact.

It is known that effective oral health education and promotion are crucial to prevent re-treatment and improve patients' oral health-related quality of life. The cost of treating periodontitis patients posed a significant financial burden to oral health services. Findings from my study estimated the average direct medical costs for non-surgical periodontal management in Malaysia to be MYR 8,863/patient per year in public clinics and MYR 16,137/patient per year in private clinics [1]. These estimates are higher than those reported in a previous study, emphasising the need to reduce the economic burden of healthcare.

Therefore, we need a collaborative effort to tackle the disease urgently. Encouraging effective home oral hygiene care and increasing diagnosis and management rates of periodontitis can result in a positive return on investment and cost savings in the long run. The economic burden of periodontitis management is significant, and policies are needed to reduce the negative impact of out-of-pocket payments for dental care, which disproportionately affect vulnerable groups.

In light of the rising prevalence of periodontal disease in Malaysia, it is imperative to devise a comprehensive strategy to prevent and manage this condition. This plan should incorporate a multifaceted approach, including oral health education, early detection of the disease, and effective preventive measures. Let's work together to improve the oral health outcomes of Malaysia and ensure a healthier future for all.

REFLECTION ON COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT FOR SUSTAINABLE IMPACT

Our postgraduate attachment at the Intercountry Centre for Oral Health (ICOH), Chiang Mai provided us with valuable insights into oral health promotion activities in Thailand. During our visit in 2022, we observed that the Thai Government places a strong emphasis on individualised oral health through the self-care concept by the Village Health Volunteers (VHVs), who are responsible for delivering these activities. Additionally, there is a strong focus on community empowerment through community oral health programmes [1]. VHVs have been an integral part of Thailand's health system since the 1970s. These volunteers are responsible for assisting the local healthcare workers in promoting health, preventing diseases as well as providing basic health services to the local communities, involving both medical and oral health components. Currently, the Ministry of Public Health in Thailand oversees approximately 1 million VHVs nationwide.




The Ministry of Public Health in Thailand has provided extensive training for these VHVs, equipping them with the skills needed to perform their duties effectively. During our visit, we observed oral cancer screening by the volunteers with the use of an oral cancer mobile application to record the findings. They also utilised teleconsultation with health care professionals for necessary referrals to clinics. By having a trained VHV in every village, we learned that it eliminates distance, time and travel costs to the clinics, thereby increasing the numbers of individuals and communities served. This concept of empowerment is something that we can adopt in Malaysia to facilitate larger population coverage and create a more sustainable oral health care system.

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One of the oral health challenges in Chang Mai is endemic fluorosis (i.e. dental and skeletal fluorosis) caused by naturally occurring high levels of fluoride (ranging from 1.5 to 7.8mg/L) in the groundwater in the Northern Region [2]. As a result, efforts are needed to implement defluoridation measures to ensure safe water consumption. A few government-subsidised reverse osmosis (RO) plants were built in response to the health needs caused by fluorosis. We observed that some of these RO plants were fully operated by the local residents, which supports community empowerment efforts. It was informed to us that these locally-operated RO plants encouraged local support for the defluoridation programme and helped reduced the final product price. In addition, some RO plants were also strategically built within the community centre or school compounds, facilitating multisectoral efforts to raise awareness about fluorosis. We witnessed a strong sense of joint responsibility shared together by health workers and community members in combating fluorosis, making it difficult to discern where one responsibility ends and another begins.



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Seeing the positive impact of empowering local communities through initiatives like trained VHVs in every village was truly inspiring. It highlighted the power of community engagement and ownership in driving sustainable change and creating lasting improvements in health outcomes. As future Dental Public Health Specialists, it is our responsibility to cultivate a strong social network with the general public in order to symbiotically improve the oral healthcare system. We believe it is imperative to reinstate the centrality of the 'Public' in the field of dental public health.

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In memory of late Dr Azura Abdullah

On 17th Feb 2023, we were saddened by the news of the passing of Dr Azura Abdullah, one of our esteemed MADPHS members. She and her husband, Mohd Rizal Othman, were involved in an accident on the North-South highway (near Gopeng) while on their way to Thailand.

Looking back at Dr Azura's journey, she received her undergraduate degree from Tokyo Medical Dental University (TMDU) in 2001 and was among the first Malaysian students to pursue dentistry at TMDU. She later returned to Malaysia and served as a dental officer in the Ministry of Health for several years before pursuing a postgraduate study in Master of Public Health (Oral Health) at the Faculty of Dentistry, Universiti Malaya.

As a dental officer, she served in various dental clinics in Klang and Hospital Tengku Ampuan Rahimah Klang. Throughout her career as a Dental Public Health Specialist, she held various positions at the State Dental Health Department, Federal Territories of Kuala Lumpur and Putrajaya. Additionally, she served in the Oral Health Programme under the Cawangan Perkembangan Profesion Kesihatan Pergigian, Ministry of Health, Malaysia and contributed significantly to the National Health Morbidity Survey (NHMS) 2017- School-Based Oral Health Survey.

We extend our deepest condolences to Dr Azura's family, friends, and loved ones. She will always be remembered for her kindness, dedication, and professionalism. May her soul rest in peace.

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
